Morning Sessions

A. Phonemic Awareness: An Essential Step in Learning to Read, Grades K-2

Phonemic Awareness is an essential building block for reading. Gain a repertoire of classroom activities to help students develop sound awareness, a critical language skill. Learn how to seamlessly implement these activities into your existing reading program. The best part? Your students will think they are playing games.

B. Primary Writing, Grades 1-3

Explore the teaching structures and classroom systems that develop primary writing. Develop strategies to take students from pictorial story through emergent and into fluent writing.

C. The Churchill School and Center Study Skills Toolkit, Grades 4-8

Study skills are important *lifelong* skills. Help your students approach their work with effective strategies for organization, managing time, listening, note-taking, reading textbooks and preparing for and taking tests.

D. Building Vocabulary, Grades 4-8

No more copying from the dictionary! Mastering new vocabulary is key to successful reading comprehension and understanding new material in all subject areas. Find out how to select the words from your curriculum that will be most useful to your students. Then, learn a variety of exciting activities and games to engage your kids with new words so they really know how to use them.

Afternoon Sessions

E. Fluency: An Essential Step in Learning to Read and Reading to Learn, Grades 1-4

Fluency, the ability to read text accurately, quickly, and with good expression is a critical component for reading comprehension. Many of us work with children who have problems in fluency and comprehension even if they have adequate but slow decoding skills. In this workshop, you will learn effective strategies for improving your students' fluency in reading.

F. Movement Enhanced Literacy, Grades K-4

Learn how to enhance your literacy lessons with movement activities. Use movement to motivate and engage your students as you assess their phonemic awareness, sound discrimination, fluency and comprehension. Use non-verbal communication to support students' expressive and receptive language as they read and write.

G. Content Subjects and Literacy: Not an Either/Or Proposition, Grades 4-8

Learn effective strategies to help your students access prior knowledge, set a purpose for reading, organize and summarize information, and make meaningful connections to narrative and expository text.

H. The Role of Executive Functions in Literacy Development, Grades 4-8

What are executive functions? How do they affect learning? This workshop will provide you with effective teaching strategies to help children develop and use executive functions for improved classroom performance.
